Assignment(s) that assess this outcome: Data Report, Week 9

How it demonstrates the outcome: Students analyze a housing-cost dataset, calculating descriptive statistics and a correlation between two variables, then write a short report interpreting the results in plain language. The grading rubric scores both statistical accuracy and quality of interpretation, so the assignment directly measures the outcome rather than just touching on quantitative content.

Outcome 3.1: Demonstrate responsibility for contributing to a more just, equitable, and sustainable world

Assignment(s) that assess this outcome: Policy Position Paper (individual, 4–5 pages)

How the assignment demonstrates the outcome: Students are assigned a current, real local or state policy, research the competing interests and evidence involved, and write a position paper that takes and defends a specific recommendation. A required reflection section (roughly one page) asks students to identify what responsibility they see themselves or their community having in the issue, and how their recommendation reflects that.
