### 4. Action Items:

## a. Biology Teacher Education (Revise Program)—Gremp, Chen

Gremp explained the revisions as proposed. Hurd asked a question about total hours; Gremp clarified. Sanchez confirmed a proposal is in the system for a prerequisite change to a required course, so that no hidden prerequisites exist. No other issues were found.

Gremp made a motion to approve this proposal. Chen seconded. All in favor, none opposed, none abstained. The motion passed.

# b. <u>Law and Philosophy Undergraduate Certificate</u> (New Certificate)—Tranel, Sattler

Sattler discussed this proposed certificate. They had questions about undergraduate certificates in general; Hurd and Sanchez answered those questions. Newport added feedback about the benefits of these certificates. No issues with this proposal were found.

Tranel made a motion to approve this proposal. Zhao seconded. All in favor, none opposed, none abstained. The motion passed.

## c. <u>Criminal Justice Sciences Accelerated Sequence</u> (Revise Program)—Chen, Shorter

Chen summarized the revisions in this proposal. It includes the same revisions as the previously approved proposal for the general CJS sequence, as well as some additional 400-level elective options. Shorter added comments about the proposal. Sattler had a question about electives; Sanchez answered this question. One format issue was found in the sample plan that did not involve content or timing of courses; Sanchez will update this to keep consistency in the format and language with other sample plans. No other issues were found.

Shorter made a motion to approve this proposal. Sattler seconded. All in favor, none opposed, none abstained. The motion passed.

## 5. Liaison Reports:

- a. Council on General Education (Newport)
   CGE met last week. Newport had no items to report for curriculum.
- b. Council for Teacher Education (Hurd)
  CTE met recently. Hurd was not in attendance; there is no no report from that
  meeting. Hurd did discuss a few of the proposed pieces of state legislation that
  will impact the University: community colleges possibly offering 4-year degrees,
  a push by community colleges to change the transfer act, and common course
  numbering. Ramsey added information they had about common course
  numbering. Newport and Sattler commented on these proposed bills.

#### 6. Miscellaneous:

The General Education revision is up for vote at tonight's Senate meeting. Coursedog implementation is progressing. Questions were raised about timing of proposals, when the current system might be shut down, and training. There are no clear answers to any of these questions yet.
